TYPES OF TV PROGRAMMES

Let's talk about TV once again, shall we? This time we can look at different types of TV programmes. People like different things, but TV has something for everybody. For viewers who like history for example, there are **documentaries** (= television programmes that give facts and information). For those who are interested in films there are **TV series** (= a set of short films about one hero), **sitcoms** (= comedy shows where you hear people laugh in the background) and even **soap operas** (= a set of short films about people's lives). For children there are **cartoons** (= like Bugs Bunny) and for those who like big prizes there are **quiz shows** (= when you have to answer questions to win something). If somebody wants to learn about famous people, **talk shows** are just for them (= shows where famous people answer questions about

themselves). No wonder TV is the most popular type of mass media.

A game show is a kind of show where people answer questions to get points.
