HOUSEHOLD JOBS

Well, my day after work is not the most exciting either. I come back home late and I eat dinner with my wife. I hate household jobs and fortunately it is my wife who **does the washing** (= washes our clothes), **the ironing** (= makes our clothes flat) and the like. I **do the hoovering** (= clean the carpets with our Electrolux), not every day, of course. My wife also **does the cooking** (= prepares our food), but I **do the washing up** (= clean the dishes). We bought ourselves **a dishwasher** (= a special



machine for washing dishes) a few years ago and I love this machine very much. We tend to **stay in** (= stay at home) during the week, we read books or magazines and watch TV. We do the same things every week.

More contexts for the new words:

- Sometimes my grandmother sweeps the floor in the kitchen.
 - (= She makes it clean with a broom)
- She likes to bake a cake at weekends.
 - (= She likes to make a cake)

ENGLISH IN USE



In this lesson we talked about actions which are regular. We can use many structures to show that something we do repeats, for example - like in the text above:

We do the same things **every week**.

Instead of "every week", we can use: **every day, every month, every year, every summer** etc. The only thing we have to remember about is that these expressions should be at the end of a sentence, as in the following:

I go to work every day. not: I every day go to work.
I go there every summer. not: I every summer go there.
