B: But it's your wedding anniversary next week, isn't it (= the day on which an important event happened in a previous year)? I'm sure your husband will think of something nice.A: Tom?! He's such a couch potato (= someone who watches a lot of television and doesn't have an active life). He's so lazy that we don't go anywhere together.

B: I have an idea, then. In two weeks' time there's a **bank holiday** (= a public holiday when shops, businesses and banks are closed) and we're going to have a day off. Why don't we go clubbing together?

A: That's a great idea. I can't wait.

More contexts for the new words:

- We're going to celebrate my nephew's **baptism** next Sunday. (= a ceremony in which someone is touched or covered with water to welcome them into the Christian world)
- I can't believe that it's Kate's **graduation** ceremony. To me she's still a small child. (= a ceremony at which you are officially said to have finished school or university)

RIO CARNIVAL

Rio de Janeiro's world famous carnival opened last year with a lot of colour and music. Hundreds of thousands of partygoers arrived in the city to dance through the streets and watch parades, samba dancers, and hundreds of other colourful attractions. In keeping with tradition, Rio's mayor handed the key to the city to the king of the carnival. Mayor Cesar Maia declared: "From this moment, happiness will **reign** across the city." The king of the carnival **echoed** these words. He said the carnival **"requires** some serious work, but...we have the right to play". He hoped people would be "**filled with** the spirit of carnival" and could "enjoy the mixing between social classes and respect each other".
